Activity on the project to revamp the museum has increased significantly in the past twelve months. Guildford Borough Council are now reviewing outline proposals which, if approved, will transform the museum.

The architects have confirmed the main features of the structure much as anticipated in the previous report. The museum will have three levels:

- There will be an entrance in the castle grounds into a new building in what is now the garden at the back of the museum.
 Here there will be a café and a shop and a new display gallery.
- On the floors below there will be another new gallery, a temporary exhibition gallery and space for activities.
- There will be lift access to all floors of Castle Arch House from the new building.
- The new building will integrate or replace the 20th century extensions to Castle Arch House.

From the standpoint of the Friends, the most interesting new proposals are the formulation of a coherent plan for the new permanent displays (the "Interpretation plan").

- The origins and history of Guildford will be told in a series of galleries in Castle Arch House entitled "Living and Being in Guildford".
- In addition, galleries in the new building will celebrate the clever people and engineers who have been notable figures locally and nationally. These galleries will be titled "Playing in Guildford" and "Working in Guildford".

The business plan for the new museum is likewise an important milestone. For the first time, specialists have looked at future visitor numbers and costs of staffing and operating the greatly enlarged facility. The plan suggests that visitor numbers could increase to 67,500 in the first year of opening, over five times the number of visitors today.

All being well, the next steps will be :

- To do a full costing of the project, including construction, fitting out, design and preparation of displays and so on.
- · To appoint a fundraiser, who will explore external funding
- To make an application to the National Lottery Heritage Fund and other external funders
- The project team will also need to convince Historic England that the new construction will not adversely affect the ancient structures of the castle grounds and Castle Arch House.

Our chairman and other Friends representatives have regularly been in contact with the project team during the past year. We believe that the envisaged new museum will be a major asset for the town. It will be a lively centre for our local community as well as an important attraction for visitors. The Council have so far been very supportive and it is important that they now give a green light to the next stage of the project.

4. Chairman's Report

Jen Powell, FoGM Chairman began by warmly welcoming everyone to the meeting.

"An especially warm welcome to James Whiteman for joining us today, and of course Jill Draper our Heritage Manager. We received apologies from Nikki Nelson-Smith and Peter O'Connell - the officer appointed to have the responsibility for our museum and its development. I was pleased to meet with him and talk about the future. He is still with us so I can't have upset him too much!!

It hardly seems any time since our AGM in May 2017 but a lot has happened. The information sent with the notification of this AGM was comprehensive. However, I must underline our sadness in the deaths of two of our committee members - Eric Morgan and Barbara Downing. Last year also saw the death of Bill Bellerby who was a founder member of the Friends. Eric had been a member of our committee since the very first meeting and was responsible for our Newsletter. The very last one that he edited was December 2017 - Issue 38. We miss Eric not only for the Newsletter but also his invaluable contributions in our meetings. Barbara also will leave a gap. She had not been well for some time but did struggle to come to our meetings.

This meeting did acknowledge the work of Marjorie Williams at the last AGM. Since that time she has (reluctantly) left the committee - her mobility was worsening and it was impossible for her to continue. Pauline Surrey, a committee member for many years, has also left the committee. Peter Hattersley and Margaret Jackson have also been unwell but still take a keen interest in activities.

The work load of committee members had obviously increased so once again a heartfelt thanks to the unstinting loyalty and hard work of those of us still in position. You will hear all of them this morning. We are indeed fortunate to have Nick Bale (with the support of Val) Jean Wickens (with the support of Harry) Hugh Anscombe and Richard Williams. Keith Powell keeps us on our toes at meetings! We have looked seriously at our committee and you see on the notification the way forward that we hope you can support.

Once again we assisted with Alice Day, and the Medieval Christmas event. (The decision to have gingerbread men instead of mince pies was a great success, inspired by Nick Bale) We were grateful for all the help and appreciated the thanks sent from both Jill Draper & Lynn Szygenda at the museum - it does make a difference. We also helped with Heritage weekend and enjoyed the excellent Medieval Machines exhibition which excited the school children during half term.

We were asked if we were prepared to be responsible for the production of an exhibition. Needless to say we couldn't refuse and I had the wonderful idea of a sub-committee under the leadership of Nick Bale. With the help of the officers, especially Melanie, this is now in place. Tunsgate was chosen as the subject for the project. Many, many thanks to those involved not only from the Friends but also other groups such as Acorns.

Members of The Friends of Guildford Museum also have the benefit of "News Update" leaflets complied by Nick. The last one. April 2018, does mention the important meeting on April 9th 2018 of the GBC Executive Advisory Committee. Those groups most interested in the future development of the museum were in attendance. I did speak on behalf of the Friends and Gavin Morgan also spoke for the Heritage Group. The councillors were supportive and we look forward into the future (distant future!) to the establishment of a wonderful Guildford Museum not forgetting the contribution of the important project "Your Stories Your Museum".

Jen handed over to Nick Bale to report on coming events. Nick began with the exhibition on Tunsgate which will be on until June, and asked members to visit and tell their friends to visit. This Friday evening sees a late night opening of the Museum—with the shops in Tunsgate invited to attend the exhibition. On June 1st Hugh Anscombe will be giving a talk in the Victorian Schoolroom on the earlier history of Tunsgate.

As regards the summer village walks – spaces are still available: 3 for Munstead Wood, 4 for Goddards, and 5 for Shamley Green. More events will be arranged for the summer including a Summer Social and a coach trip organised by Carol Brown – details to be arranged. Nick also asked members to sign up to help at the Alice Day on Sunday 5 August for an hour or so between 11 and 4.

5. Treasurer's Report

Richard Williams reported that it had been an uneventful year for the finances, although subscriptions were slightly down, as were There was a surplus on events – the same as last year although the costs were higher. The BAFM Insurance had also gone up. Overall there was a surplus on the year of £1,500. There is currently £44,000 in the bank waiting for the museum to say what they wish to spend it on. Richard also thanked Joan Hattersley for checking the accounts.

There were no questions from members. The accounts were formally adopted, proposed Nick Bale and seconded Keith Powell.

6. Secretary's Report

Jean Wickens stated there was little to report –4 committee meetings had been held through the year. Contact had recently been made with other Friends of Museum organisations in Surrey to advertise the Tunsgateexhibition, and these links may be worth pursuing in the future.

7. Heritage Manager's Report

Jill Draper asked us to cast our minds back to last year's AGM, the architects had just been appointed, the museum had started working with new partners and the work on Your Stories Your Museum had just begun. What has happened in the last year?

What a year it has been — a very busy year. The architects and museum staff have been working and talking with Heritage England to ensure that proposals meet with their requirements. Suggestions on what we want to do are followed by a discussion and then further reconsideration due to the museum being a listed building. This is exciting but also a challenge. Need to think of creative ways for 21st Century visitors.

A lot of work has been done on Your Stories Your Museum and the power point presentation shown on screen before the AGM has shown some of this work. The team have taken the project and the museum out into the community and asked members of the public what they would like to see.

The new gallery the Discovery lounge which used to be the SAS Library has tried out new things, new interpretations for example using ipads, audio commentaries, etc and has obtained feedback. This work has enabled us to work with specific targeted groups in the community eg children with disabilities, visually impaired people, people with learning disabilities and people with dementia for example. One project — 'Learning to Fly' enabled visually impaired people to work with a poet in a participative way.

The Community Exhibitions are also working with members of the community. The first was the Joining In project at park Barn, and the second the FoGM exhibition on Tunsgate – which was timely with the opening of Tunsgate Square.

We have consulted over 1650 people, attended 21 events through the whole borough, with 440 participants who have never been involved with the museum before and have obtained 25 new volunteers. The events have involved both trained staff and volunteers. There has been an improved social media presence including a new scheme to present a museum object on social media.

Overall it has been a really satisfying year, the museum is getting busier, the Medieval machines exhibition brought in large numbers of visitors and visitor numbers in general are going up so the work is starting to bear fruit.

Looking forward, we are aware that those who have been supporting the museum over many years, are frustrated by the seeming lack of progress which has seemed to go in fits and starts. But the groundwork has been laid and the project is gaining momentum. Work over the last 2 years has reached a critical mass, and we have secured GBC funding for the next 2 years for working with the community and building up the new museum. We can expect the architectural design to be produced within this financial year. You may have heard of the chinese proverb which says that a thousand miles begins with a single step – we have lots of single steps and things are now moving forward.

Jill thanked the Friends for their continuing support both this year and in previous years plus the increased involvement of Friends. Jill emphasised that they want us to keep in touch with what the museum is doing.

James Whiteman added his thanks to those of Jill's for everything the Friends do for the museum. Next year he is hoping that the leader of the council will also attend the Friends AGM. He confirmed that he is committed to the museum project, despite all the demands of implementing the Local plan, the Corporate Plan, the North Street Developmentetc. Themuseum is a priority—hetalks to his management team every week to keep up to date with progress. He also thanked Carol Brown, who has recently retired, and all the museum staff.

The process for tendering for project specialists eg interpretation, programme management is underway. He is committed to the museum buildings and there will be more attempts to get further involvement. Later this year Plans and costs will be going to the Executive.

Jen thanked James for giving his time and his commitment.

Carol Brown commented that she was very pleased and excited to hear Jill and James so passionate about the project.

Heather Harrison said that the Tunsgate exhibition was excellent – not too academic and it means something to the people who live there. She asked whether it could be put up in the Tunsgate area eg into the shops? It would be a shame for it to just close.

Nick said that he would love to do that, the channels of communication are open. Jill confirmed that if it can be taken into Tunsgate she would like to see it done.

8. Recommendations for the annual subscription for the year 2018-2019

Hugh Anscombe said that after some discussion the committee were recommending no change. Sheila Davidson said she thought it was going to change this year following last year's AGM. Hugh explained that it involves a lot of extra work to change the subscription.

Hugh also reported that memberships currently stand at 123 memberships, 149 members. He reminded people that there was a column on the signing in sheet for GDPR and reminded members to complete their forms by 25 May if possible.

He also confirmed there are spaces still available for the summer events and has a list of who is booked if people are unsure about their bookings.

Jen expressed concerns that the membership is going down. (At this point Jill Draper and James Whiteman left the meeting)

9. Election of Officers and Committee Members

Jen asked members to turn their agendas over to look at the list of committee posts etc as some work has already been done to fill vacant posts. Jen is grateful to Carol Brown for agreeing to join the committee. Also to Carol Smithyes and Chris Hetherington who do not want to attend the committee. Carol has agreed to take on the Undercroft Volunteers rota, and Chris will be organising the Winter Talks programme.

Jen would be very pleased to have a full committee – and said that we would be very grateful for anybody here today who would like to join the committee.

Jen was voted in as Chairman (proposed Carol Brown, seconded Nick Bale)

The Committee was voted en bloc (proposed Jill Buist, seconded Val Bale)

10. Any other Business

Peter Hattersley commented that as a past chairman, he has some understanding of the work the committee does and he would like to thank all the committee and officers for their work over the last year.

Jen wished to bring member's attention to the Horsley Magazine

Jen thanked everyone again for attending the AGM and said that we were looking forward to Roger Nicholas's talk.
